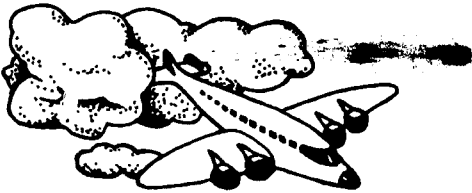


## WHERE ARE THEY GOING?
